The Right to Grow is almost here, prepare for launch in 2025!

We're pleased to report that the final Task and Finish group to bring the legal and policy framework of Hull's Right to Grow together took place at Hull Guildhall on 13th November. The current plan is that the legal agreement and process will be signed off by Hull City Council by March 2025 and people will be able to start applying for licences to grow on public land from then.

Although Hull's work on the Right to Grow hit the headlines in October last year, the journey to get to this point has been a long and twisty one, starting many years ago by grassroots organisations in Hull and nationally.

National News

Major report exposes lack of regulation and accountability in food system

The Food Foundation's ['State of the Nation's Food'](#) report highlights the performance of major UK retailers, Out of Home businesses, and food manufacturers and looks at what steps they are taking to help us shift towards more healthy and sustainable diets.

The report [focuses on 11 metrics and benchmarks 36 companies](#) against a range of criteria to assess who is leading the way and what more needs to be

done to help fix our unsustainable, unhealthy and unfair food system.

Changing the Conversation: how citizens see the food system – and their appetite for government intervention

The [Food Conversation](#) is the UK's largest-ever citizen deliberation on food systems. Citizens' assemblies have taken place in all four nations, involving more than 300 citizens.

The Food Conversation aims to provide a well evidenced view of what citizens really think about food, exploring how citizens understand the complexities of the issue and the necessity for trade-offs.

[Citizens conclude that the current food system is unfair, unhealthy and unsustainable](#). They want the government to put measures in place to improve leadership across the system, address power imbalances, ensure learning and collaboration, get a fairer deal for farmers, and unlock the power of local areas.

Child Poverty Action Group launch new report on the cost of School meal debt

[This short report](#) looks at the challenges facing schools when implementing a means-tested school meal system, and the debt families are incurring for school meals in primary schools across England (excluding London where all children are offered a free school meal through the Mayor of London's universal primary policy).

Kids' Food and Drink Collective launches with challenge to supermarkets 'awash with HFSS and ultra processed food'

The [Kids' Food and Drink Collective \(KFDC\)](#) launched in September with nine brands as founder members, all of whom [claim to be non HFSS and are committed to minimising the use of UPF ingredients](#). The group was formed by Jess Mackenzie, founder of the children's meal brand Jess Cooks, who criticised what she called the "terrible lack of innovation" by retailers in creating healthy kids' food, which she said meant many young people were beginning life on diet of fish fingers and chicken nuggets.

Freddie's Farm co founder Laurie Fermor added: "Parents are trying to do their best and make the right choices but there is so much cleverly marketed rubbish on supermarket shelves.

"Being part of the Kids' Food and Drink Collective will drive change in an area that desperately needs it and help give the nation's children the best possible start in life."

"Kids' food is absolutely awash with junk," Mackenzie said, "I challenge anyone to try to find kids meals in the big retailers that are not mostly HFSS."

“We are here to try to start a dialogue with retailers about how we can bring desperately needed innovation to this category.”

Forum: VCSE Post-Budget Survey. Deadline 20th December

Following the Autumn Budget 2024, Forum would like to ask you some specific questions concerning the impact of these proposals on your group or organisation. In particular there is a proposed increase in employer *National Insurance Contributions (NICs), the National Living Wage and the Real Living Wage.

Your responses will be anonymous but will help Forum to capture the challenges Hull's VCSE are facing. The results of this survey will also support Forum to campaign to allow the sector to be exempt from the increases and to raise this issue with our public sector partners.

*Outlined in the budget is the government's decision to:

- Raise the National Living Wage to £12.21 an hour,
- Increase the Real Living Wage to £12.60 per hour
- Increase employer National Insurance contributions to 15% on salaries above £5k, instead of 13.8% on salaries above £9.1k currently.

These changes pose major challenges for the VCSE sector, with an estimated additional cost (nationally) of £1.4 billion that will affect VCSE organisations at a time when funding pressures are already high.

Save our Fruit and Veg. National campaign

Less than 2% of UK farmland is used for fruit and veg production, while nearly half of all growers fear they could go out of business within a year. Meanwhile, the UK imports over 80% of our fruit and nearly half of all our vegetables. This is simply unsustainable – we need to act now to boost home-grown fruit and veg.

The Soil Association is calling for urgent action from the UK government to help:

- Double the percentage of UK land used to grow fruit and veg
- Increase demand for fruit and veg - starting with supporting schools to serve up healthy, veg-packed meals for children
- Increase fruit and veg production through nature-friendly practices - like organic - that will protect wildlife and nourish the soil

Don't let a loan shark ruin your Christmas

Christmas is coming – a time of parties, presents, good food and celebrations. But it can also bring stress, worry and financial pressure. Loan sharks recognise this, and it can be a time of year when they take advantage of the most vulnerable by pretending that they are helping out in a time of need.

The Illegal Money Lending Team (IMLT) is a national organisation which investigates and prosecute illegal lenders and supports borrowers. It is better known as [Stop Loan Sharks](#).

Illegal money lenders are not always easy to spot. They could be a neighbour who always stops to chat, a parent who you know from the school gate, a popular work colleague, even a long-standing family friend. Borrowers often aren't aware that they have borrowed from a loan shark until it's too late. Things can quickly turn nasty as they demand repayments and issue threats of violence when you can't pay.

There are warning signs to look out for which may all indicate that someone is a loan shark. They include:

- Being given no paperwork or details about the loan
- The lender demanding repayments that add up to much more than you initially borrowed
- Being intimidated or threatened by the lender if you struggle to pay
- The lender demanding you hand over items like bank cards or a passport until you can pay

If you do need to borrow, the IMLT advises people to contact their nearest credit union, which offer an alternative, ethical and safe way of borrowing for people who may have been refused credit: www.findyourcreditunion.co.uk

If you think you have been targeted by a loan shark, get in touch with the IMLT as soon as possible in complete confidence. Their specialist officers can offer advice and support and investigate the illegal lender. To get in touch:

Funding

Household Support Fund: Short Term Grant Funding for Affordable Warmth – Deadline 9th December

Funding from the Department of Work and Pensions (Household Support Fund) is being made available via Hull City Council and has kindly been supplemented by local company Ideal Heating. This is being administered on their behalf by Forum CIO. This will be small short-term grant funding.

The purpose of the grant is to enable VCSE organisations to provide support to Hull residents to manage their household expenditure on energy, and cope with the cost of living. VCSE organisations are encouraged to provide Warm Spaces and activities that promote affordable warmth.

Grants of between £1,000 - £7,500 are offered to voluntary and community organisations supporting local communities in the city of Hull. The maximum grant you can apply for depends on the type of project you will run.

Woodward Charitable Trust – Deadline 13th December

The funding is for charitable organisations in the UK, to support core costs in the following areas:

- Children and young people (up to 25 years) who are isolated, at risk of exclusion or involved in antisocial behaviour. This covers gang violence and knife crime, education and mentoring, as well as projects that work to raise self-esteem and employment opportunities and encourage an active involvement in and contribution towards the local community.
- Disadvantaged families. This covers parenting support and guidance, mental health, food poverty, refuges and domestic violence projects.
- Prisoners and ex-offenders and specifically projects that maintain and develop contact with prisoners' families and help with the rehabilitation and resettlement of prisoners and/or ex-offenders after their release.

The majority of an applicant's beneficiaries (more than 50%) must be within at least one of these areas to be eligible.

Grants of up to £3,000 are available. However, most grants are for £1,000 or less. A small number of larger grants of more than £3,000 will also be awarded but only to charities that are known to the Trustees.

Most grants are only for one year; funding is available for a maximum of three consecutive years or three grants within five years. After their last grant, organisations should wait two years before reapplying for a further grant.

Funding for Community Tree Planting Projects – Deadline 13th December

The International Tree Foundation is offering grants for community-based organisations across the UK to deliver tree-planting projects that protect and restore indigenous trees and woodlands, support community engagement in tree planting, and increase awareness of the importance of trees and forests to environmental and human well-being.

The UK Community Tree Planting Programme will support projects that meet the following essential criteria:

- Plant trees in public/publicly accessible spaces: sites that are readily accessible to the public, including schools, parks, rights of way, and sites managed by community groups.
- Plant indigenous tree species: this may include traditional fruit trees and 'honorary' natives where appropriate.
- Engage community members in tree planting and enjoying the benefits of woodlands.
- Have clear plans for maintenance and sustainability.

In addition, for this funding round proposed projects must meet one or more of the following criteria:

- Engage children and young adults in tree planting and learning about trees.
- Engage vulnerable groups and groups with low access to woodlands.
- Create biodiversity in habitats.
- Conserve soil and water.
- Demonstrate new approaches, such as agroforestry.
- Support rewilding and natural regeneration.
- Support work or research on tree pest and disease resistance and climate change adaptation.
- Support urban tree planting.

Grants are available across two funding streams:

- Grants for community woodland/hedging projects that range from 100 to 25,000 trees planted per year, with a maximum price equivalent to £1.95 per tree.
- Grants for community orchard projects of up to 30 trees planted per year.

There is a two-stage application process. Groups must first [submit an online Expression of Interest form](#) before being shortlisted to complete a full application.

Weston Charity Awards – Deadline 8th January 2025

Garfield Weston Foundation, in partnership with Pilotlight, is accepting applications from registered charities across the North of England working in the fields of youth, welfare, environment, and community, for the Weston Charity Awards.

The Awards offer a package of support, worth over £22,000, intended to deliver long-term benefit to the charity, including a fully funded year of support from Pilotlight and an unrestricted cash contribution of £6,500.

The 22 Award Finalists will receive:

- A fully funded year of support from Pilotlight.
- An unrestricted cash contribution of £6,500 to support the work with Pilotlight, this includes travel expenses to meetings.
- Access to a network of local charities working with Pilotlight.
- Two peer-to-peer sessions with other Award Winners across the year.

To apply, groups must have an annual income of less than £5 million, have delivered a service for at least two years, have at least one paid full-time member of staff in a leadership position, and have the majority of activity or beneficiaries in the Midlands, North of England or Wales.

Steel Charitable Trust – Deadline 15th January 2025

The Steel Charitable Trust Under 26 Fund is for charities working with or on behalf of children and young people under 26, with an emphasis on creating educational and/or access opportunities for those in circumstances, groups, or locations that face economic challenges, social marginalisation or poor outcomes in later life.

All grants awarded will be for restricted funding. However, this does not preclude specifically stated running or capital costs, such as contributions to a salary for a stated role, detailed IT upgrades, or a building renovation. New project costs or contributions towards ongoing projects are also permitted.

The minimum grant size is £10,000. Most one-off grants will fall in the range of between £10,000 and £25,000. To apply for the UK Under 26 Fund, groups must:

- Be a UK-registered charity or exempt charity as defined in the Charities Act 2011 or its equivalents in Scotland and Northern Ireland.
- Be seeking funding for work that will be delivered in any part of the UK, except Luton.
- Have a minimum income of £50,000 in the previous financial year.
- Be able to produce at least one full year of accounts, that confirms the required income threshold.

Unless specifically invited to do so, groups may only make one application within any 18 months (on the month of application), whether successful or not.

BBC Children in Need Emergency Essentials Programme – no deadline

This programme, delivered by Family Fund Business Services, supports children and young people up to and including the age of 17 who are facing exceptionally difficult circumstances with items that meets their most basic needs.

Applications must be completed by a registered referrer who is part of an organisation that is supporting the family or young person and capable of assessing their needs. The referrer's organisation should also be able to administer and supervise the grant on their behalf.

The programme can deliver or fund critical items such as:

- Cookers
- Furniture
- Kitchen equipment and small appliances
- Children's beds and bedding (including cots)
- Washing machines and tumble dryers
- Fridges, freezers and fridge-freezers
- Baby equipment
- Clothing for an emergency/crisis

The support is for children and young people under 18 years of age, who are UK or EU citizens normally resident in the UK, and whose family does not have access to support and insufficient resources to meet the child's needs. Due to the high demand, only one application per household within a 12 month period will be accepted. The application for each household will take into account the needs of all children under the one application, it does not mean only one child per household can be supported.

Consideration may be given where a child or young person, or their family, have an asylum application under assessment or in circumstances where residency criteria is not consistent across the family unit.

There are no deadlines. Applications are processed usually within 10 working days.
