## Local News

### Hull and East Yorkshire Local Nature Recovery Strategy is published

The [Hull and East Yorkshire Local Nature Recovery Strategy \(HEY LNRS\)](#) has been published this month, making it the first one in Yorkshire. This strategy will play a vital role in shaping a more resilient environment for years to come, delivering benefits for nature, people and places across the region.

The HEY LNRS is formed of two main components, the strategy document and the interactive map. The strategy document lays out the priority habitats and species for nature recovery in the region and the measures that can be taken to help their recovery.

The interactive LNRS map brings the Local Nature Recovery Strategy to life, showing how nature recovery priorities are distributed across Hull and East Yorkshire. Using spatial data and local evidence, the map highlights priority habitats, opportunity areas and locations where targeted action can deliver the greatest benefits for nature, climate and people.

You can explore the map to better understand what is happening in your area, view different data layers, and see how the LNRS can help inform land management, planning, project development and funding opportunities.

The map is designed to support collaboration and informed decision-making, whether you are a land manager, local authority, community group or interested resident.

## **Weekly food and garden waste collections set to launch in Hull from March 2026**

Hull City Council is preparing to introduce [Simpler Recycling](#), a new government-led policy designed to make recycling clearer and more consistent across the country.

From Tuesday 31 March 2026, the majority of households across Hull will receive weekly brown bin and outdoor food caddy collections, doubling the frequency of the current fortnightly service.

Dry recyclables will continue to be collected across the city, with households that already use blue bins for recycling to see no change to their service. However, as part of the national rollout, new recycling infrastructure will be introduced at flats, communal properties and flats above shops on a phased basis over the coming year.

The council will be reinvigorating its food waste collection service for those properties on the weekly kerbside caddy collection and will be redistributing caddies across the city to those who need them.

In addition, the number of free caddy liner collection points have been expanded to make it easier for residents to pick up replacements.

To avoid compostable liners smelling or splitting, the council recommends emptying kitchen caddies regularly, using two liners if needed, and securing them tightly before placing them in the brown bin or outside caddy. storytelling and recognition. The Awards have been heavily subsidised to ensure charities can attend and celebrate their peers across the sector. Tickets will cost charities £10 and includes, welcome drink, three course meal, the Award ceremony and entertainment.

Every shortlisted nominee will be invited to attend the awards evening, where winners will be announced in front of peers, partners and supporters.

## National News

### DEFRA National Security Assessment reveals threat to UK food security

If current trends in the decline of vital ecosystems continue, the world will see more and worse crop failures, infectious diseases, natural disasters and political instability, according to the [Global biodiversity loss, ecosystem collapse and national security report](#), released by the UK Government last month.

The UK is at risk of the fallout from increased competition for food and water and increasing conflict. [This would limit the UK's ability to import food, drive up prices, and lead to falling economic prosperity and increased hunger.](#)

Factors that make the UK particularly at risk include that the country is “unable to be food self-sufficient at present, based on current diets and prices”. The UK is heavily reliant on imports for fresh fruit, vegetables and sugar.

According to the assessment, some ecosystems vital to global food and water risk collapse in the next 5 years, and crop failure is already leading to the migration of hundreds of thousands of people. It also warns that “conflict and military escalation will become more likely, both within and between states, as groups compete for arable land and food and water resources”. In the UK,

farmers have already warned extreme weather could lead to food shortages and civil unrest.

[Sustain recommends](#) that the Government must now look to planning, nature recovery and food and farming policy to mutually support each other to deliver the wholesale changes in diets and food production that security experts recommend. Farming policy must prioritise global ecosystem recovery, and nature and climate policy include measures to grow more foods that boost our resilience and aren't heavily reliant on imports. Immediate actions include:

- Halting any further expansion of intensive livestock production
- Investing in projects like Bridging the Gap, to unlock profitable supply chains that increase the production and consumption of organic fruit, vegetables and legumes
- A horticulture investment strategy that boosts commercial production of UK vegetables, beans, pulses, legumes and nuts, as well as increasing the UK market for these products
- Ending the exploitative practices of large agri-food corporations, and give farmers more power to set prices and market conditions
- Funding farmer cooperatives, networks, and mentoring schemes to scale agroecological farming through knowledge sharing, pooling resources and building collective market power

### **Ultra-processed foods should be regulated like tobacco say researchers**

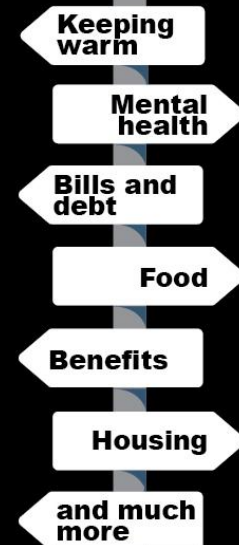
Ultra-processed foods (UPFs) have more in common with cigarettes than with fruit or vegetables, and require far tighter regulation, according to a new report. UPFs and cigarettes are engineered to encourage addiction and consumption, researchers from three US universities said in their report '[From Tobacco to Ultraprocessed Food: How Industry Engineering Fuels the Epidemic of Preventable Disease](#)'.

UPFs, which are widely available worldwide, are food products that have been industrially manufactured, often using emulsifiers or artificial colouring and flavours. The category includes soft drinks and packaged snacks such as crisps and biscuits.

[While food, unlike tobacco, is essential for survival](#), the authors argue that the distinction makes action doubly necessary because it is difficult to opt out of the modern food environment.

The authors suggested that lessons from tobacco regulation, "including litigation, marketing restrictions and structural interventions", could offer a guide to reducing harm related to UPFs, calling for public health efforts to "shift from individual responsibility to food industry accountability".

# Every child deserves a healthy start Help with food and vitamins when you need it the most



## Get help to buy healthy food and milk with NHS Healthy Start

Are you missing out on help with the cost of a healthy diet for your family? You could be eligible for the NHS Healthy Start scheme if you aren't already receiving it. NHS Healthy Start helps families and pregnant women on low incomes with the cost of healthy food, milk and vitamins.

If you're more than 10 weeks pregnant or you have children under four and receive certain benefits, you could be eligible. People who are under 18 and more than 10 weeks pregnant are eligible, even if they don't receive any benefits.

Once on the scheme, you'll receive a prepaid card that is topped up with payments every four weeks. You could get:

- £4.25 each week after the 10th week of pregnancy
- £8.50 each week for children from birth to one year old
- £4.25 each week for children between one and four years old

You can use the card to buy fruit, vegetables, pulses, milk and infant formula. It's accepted in most places that sell healthy food and accept Mastercard® payments. You'll also be able to get free Healthy Start vitamins.

Applying online takes around five minutes and you'll get an instant decision.

- **Day 3 - Funding & funder language** - We practise talking about your project in clear funder words (need, activities, outcomes) and start one simple project idea.
- **Day 4 - Inner work, communication & boundaries** - We look at guilt, pressure and burnout. You learn simple tools for saying no, setting limits and feeling safer in your role.
- **Day 5 - Visibility & community engagement** - We plan how to use WhatsApp, Facebook and other ways to talk to your community, without being online 24/7.

#### **Tribune Trust – Deadline 31st March**

The Trust aims to improve quality of life by making local communities safer and better places in which to live, work, invest and do business.

Through its funding, the Trust hopes to:

- Protect vulnerable victims

To be eligible, applicants must meet the following criteria:

#### **Hull & East Riding Charitable Trust (HERCT) – Deadline 20th April**

Hull & East Riding Charitable Trust (HERCT) award grants to local charities and community groups within Hull & East Yorkshire providing good to the residents. Most grants awarded are under £5,000 but larger projects will be considered with match funding.

The HERCT will fund a variety of projects such as:

- Music and arts projects, especially those that involve people from disadvantaged backgrounds
- Community projects especially those that support residents in marginalised groups in the area
- Purchase of equipment materials
- Support for children to attend trips from schools / groups in disadvantaged areas
- Requests from notable buildings with a good level of community use
- Significant community projects demanding major funding, support may be given by way of a pledge, payment conditional upon all other funding sources being agreed

### **Sea Changers Innovation Fund – Deadline 30th April**

[Sea-Changers](#) is the UK charity dedicated to raising money for UK-based marine conservation. Its vision is to create a world where the seas and shores are clean and healthy and marine species are protected.

This fund aims to support innovative marine conservation approaches and solutions with grants of up to £10,000. This includes any innovation that may:

- Address the root causes of marine conservation threats and challenges in the UK.
- Prevent or reduce negative impacts on UK coastal and marine environments and/or species.
- Add to the body of knowledge about marine conservation threats and challenges in the UK and ways to overcome them.

Eligible projects include:

- Research - for example innovative citizen-science projects, and new ways to measure and monitor marine environmental issues.
- Direct action - for example innovative approaches to coastal clean up, and new solutions to reduce pollution.
- Species protection - for example projects that support, replenish or protect threatened marine species in new ways.
- Education/community engagement - for example projects that educate and involve people, businesses and/or communities in marine conservation in ways that are previously untested.

Projects can be in the very early stages (e.g. developing a prototype or model), be a developed idea that needs piloting in order to gather evidence of its efficacy or be an idea that, while tested in other parts of the world, is a new solution for the UK marine environment and needs to be tested here.

## Groundwork Grassroots Grants – Deadline September

Groundwork is working with People's Postcode Lottery for a third year to deliver Grassroots Grants. This year, the programme will provide unrestricted funding of up to £2,000 to 700 small, local organisations in England that are making a positive difference in their communities.

It's very much aimed at smaller organisations with income below £25,000 in the last year and applications may be submitted at any time between January and September.

Funding can be used for project ideas within an organisation's charitable or constituted objects including access to food or basic essentials, improvements to local green spaces, cultural initiatives, support or wellbeing activities, volunteering opportunities to improve the local environment or support people or training to improve the capacity building of your organisation.

They will consider costs for a range of purposes which could include:

- Paying staff or volunteer expenses
- Costs for equipment or materials
- Core, ongoing running costs of your organisation, such as, rent, utilities, and other general running costs
- Training for staff and volunteers
- Consultant time to help develop your organisation or key policies

**FREE Webinar:** New UK restrictions on the advertising of 'less healthy' food and drink products: loopholes and likely effectiveness, [26th February](#)

In January 2026, paid advertisements for products high in fat, sugar and salt (HFSS) were banned online at all times and on television before the 9pm 'watershed'. Modelling studies suggest the ban could remove billions of calories from children's diets and deliver significant health benefits. But questions remain about the legislation's overall effectiveness and potential industry workarounds. During this webinar Professor Boyland will provide an overview of the new ban, unpick its strengths and weaknesses, and consider "where next?" for food advertising policy.
